DAY 22:

2 Chronicles 7:14 - If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

This verse highlights the transformative power of repentance—not just on an individual level but for an entire community. When God's people humble themselves, pray, and turn from sin, it opens the door for divine restoration. Repentance is about feeling remorse and a heartfelt turning back to God. It demonstrates a collective recognition of our need for Him, and God promises that when His people respond in this way, He will act—bringing forgiveness and healing. This verse reminds us that God's power is unlocked in unity and humility when we come to Him. Whether in our homes, churches, or communities, repentance can restore broken relationships, heal divisions, and bring new life where there was once brokenness. It's a call to trust that God will move in mighty ways when we align our hearts with His.

DAY 23:

Psalm 85:6 - Will you not revive us again, that your people may rejoice in you?

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

This verse highlights the connection between revival and joy. When our hearts grow distant from God, joy often fades, replaced by weariness, frustration, or emptiness. But true rejoicing comes when God breathes new life into us through spiritual revival. Revival is not just an emotional experience—it's a restoration of our relationship with God. When we return to Him with open hearts, He revives us, rekindling the joy we thought was lost. This joy is rooted not in circumstances but in the renewed awareness of God's presence and love. If you've been struggling with lost joy, Psalm 85:6 reminds us that joy follows revival. When we seek God wholeheartedly, He renews and restores us, filling us with a joy that only He can give.

<u>Prayer</u>

Lord, my heart feels heavy, and I realize how much I've lost the joy I once had in You. I crave that joy again—the kind that comes only from being close to You. Revive me, Lord! Breathe new life into my spirit, renew my passion for You, and awaken what's grown cold. Restore my joy, not based on circumstances but on knowing You deeply. DAY 24:

Hosea 6:2 - After two days he will revive us; on the third day he will restore us, that we may live in his presence.

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

Hosea 6:2 says, "After two days he will revive us; on the third day he will restore us, that we may live in his presence." This verse points to God's restorative power, and it prophetically connects to the resurrection of Jesus, who rose on the third day, bringing life and hope to all who believe. In the same way that Israel longed for restoration, the resurrection of Christ offers us the ultimate revival—life out of death. Just as Jesus rose from the grave, we are invited to rise from spiritual death into a new life with Him. Hosea reminds us that God's healing work is often a process, but His timing is perfect. What may feel like a delay—whether two days or three—is part of God's plan to bring life and renewal. The resurrection assures us that even after seasons of brokenness, God's restoration is sure. Through Christ, we are not only revived but invited to live forever in His presence. His resurrection becomes our hope, teaching us that life with God always ends in victory.

<u>Prayer</u>

Lord, thank You for Your promise to revive and restore. Help me trust in Your timing, knowing that You are always working to bring new life. Because Jesus rose, I can rise too, walking in hope and joy. In His name. Amen.



DAY 25:

Habakkuk 3:2 - Lord, I have heard of your fame; I stand in awe of your deeds, Lord. Repeat them in our day, in our time make them known; in wrath remember mercy.

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

Think about how people talk about sports legends—how Michael Jordan scored 38 points during the flu game or how Serena Williams fought injuries to win championships. Even though we weren't on the court or field to see it firsthand, those stories stirred something in us. We started to hope to experience something amazing like that in our time. Habakkuk's prayer mirrors that longing. He recalls God's great works and asks for revival—for God to do something just as powerful today. It's a reminder that the God who parted seas and delivered nations can still act mighty, offering mercy even in judgment. Just as we crave to see greatness reappear in sports, we can pray for God to revive His works in our generation.

PRAYER

Lord, I've heard of Your mighty acts and long to see them again today. Show Your power in my life, revive our hearts, and let Your mercy shine even in difficult moments. In Jesus' name, Amen.



DAY 26:

Isaiah 57:15 - For this is what the high and exalted One says—he who lives forever, whose name is holy: 'I live in a high and holy place, but also with the one who is contrite and lowly in spirit, to revive the spirit of the lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite.

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

This verse highlights a beautiful paradox: while God reigns in holiness far above all creation, He is also intimately present with those who are broken, humble, and lowly in spirit. When we are at our lowest—overwhelmed by life's burdens, disappointments, or personal failures—God draws near to restore and lift us. It's easy to feel distant from God during difficult moments, but Isaiah reminds us that He is closest to those with a contrite heart. As a parent kneels to comfort a hurting child, God meets us where we are, offering healing and revival. True humility allows us to experience His closeness profoundly, reminding us that His power is perfected in our weakness.

<u>Prayer</u>

Lord, thank You for being near when my heart feels low and my spirit is heavy. Revive me with Your presence and help me walk humbly, knowing that You are always close, even in my brokenness. In Jesus' name, Amen.



DAY 27:

Psalm 51:10 - Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me.

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

In Psalm 51:10, David prays, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me." The word "create" is powerful here because it reminds us that a clean heart isn't something we can produce ourselves—God must create it. Just as God created the universe out of nothing, He can make a pure heart within us when we are spiritually depleted or broken. David doesn't request a repaired or improved heart but a completely new one. This highlights the profound transformation we need, exceedingly after we've sinned or strayed. Only God can do this work, bringing us back to a place of purity and right standing with Him. It's a divine act of renewal, something we cannot achieve by our efforts but must humbly seek from the One who has the power to make us new.

<u>Prayer</u>

Lord, I recognize that only You can create in me a clean heart. I ask that You transform my spirit, making me new and pure in Your sight. Renew my heart today so that I may live in a way that pleases You. In Jesus' name, Amen.



DAY 28:

Acts 3:19 - "Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord.

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

Acts 3:19 says, "Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord." The image of our sins being "wiped out" is powerful and brings to mind the idea of something being completely erased or cleansed. Imagine writing with a pencil on paper and you make a mistake. You could try to cross it out or cover it up, but the marks still show the error. However, when you take an eraser and wipe it away, the mistake is gone—clean, as if it was never there. That's the kind of cleansing God offers us when we repent. He doesn't just cover over our sins or leave traces behind; He wipes them away completely, giving us a fresh start, like a clean sheet of paper. God's forgiveness through repentance is total. No matter how deeply our mistakes are written into our lives, when we turn to Him, He wipes them away completely, bringing healing and "times of refreshing" to our hearts.

<u>Prayer</u>

Lord, thank You for Your promise to wipe away my sins when I turn to You. Help me live in the freedom of Your forgiveness, knowing that in You, I have a fresh start every day. In Jesus' name, Amen. Week 5: Living in the Spirit



DAY 29

Galatians 5:25 - "Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit."

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

This verse highlights the vital role of the Holy Spirit as the life source for every believer. Just as our physical bodies need food, water, and air to stay alive, our spiritual life is sustained by the Spirit. The Holy Spirit not only gives us new life when we come to faith but also guides, empowers, and directs us in how we live daily. Living by the Spirit means we are not self-sufficient. Our strength, wisdom, and direction come from staying connected to the Holy Spirit, much like staying plugged into the source of power. Keeping "in step with the Spirit" is about aligning our actions, decisions, and desires with His guidance, ensuring that our lives reflect God's will and purpose. Just as a tree draws life from its roots to bear fruit, we draw our life from the Spirit to live out the fruits of the Spirit—love, joy, peace, and more. Without the Spirit as our life source, our spiritual vitality fades, but with Him, we thrive and grow in Christ-likeness.

DAY 30:

Romans 8:11 - "And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you."

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

Romans 8:11 says, "And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you." This verse emphasizes the incredible power of the Holy Spirit living within us—the same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead now gives life to our physical and spiritual beings. Just as the Spirit brought Jesus back to life after the crucifixion, that same power is at work in us, reviving our souls and empowering us to live in victory over sin and death. This life-giving Spirit sustains us spiritually and promises to one day raise us to eternal life, just as Christ was raised. The verse assures us that our hope is anchored in God's resurrection power, available to us daily as we walk in the Spirit.

DAY 31:

John 7:38 - "Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, rivers of living water will flow from within them."

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHT

Jesus promises that those who trust in Him will have an internal source of spiritual life that continually flows, nourishing them and blessing others around them. As we come to the end of this month, particularly after a spiritually intense time like a revival or a focused season of prayer, it's important to remember that the rivers of living water Jesus speaks of are meant to keep flowing. The spiritual renewal and passion that may have been ignited over these last weeks shouldn't end with the calendar month. Instead, Jesus invites us to continue drawing from Him daily, allowing the Holy Spirit to sustain and refresh us so that we don't run dry. The key is staying connected to the source—Christ. Just as rivers don't stop flowing when seasons change, our spiritual vitality doesn't need to stop when special events or October ends. By staying in the Word, in prayer, and in community, we ensure that these living waters refresh us and others long after the revival or season is over.

<u>Prayer</u>

Lord, help me keep the rivers of Your Spirit flowing in my life, even after this month ends. May I remain connected to You, trusting that You will continually refresh and sustain me, so that I can be a source of life and blessing to others. In Jesus' name, Amen.
